Dr. Nayo Hill, PT, DPT, PhD, is a postdoctoral research fellow at Kennedy Krieger Center for Movement Studies and Department of Neuroscience at Johns Hopkins University. Dr. Hill's research investigates the development of motor learning mechanisms necessary for children to learn a novel task. She has developed interactive, web-based games that are completed on a home computer to explore children's ability to accurately learn the motor task when given a binary (success or fail) reward signal. - Identify the brain structures involved in controlling movement
- Describe different types of motor learning and how the brain adjusts when encountering novel environments
- Discuss the implications of injury to the brain and strategies for acquisition of new motor skills.

The brain is a complex organ orchestrating all of the processes required for sustaining life. Some of these processes are automatic while others, such as movement, are learned and refined through practice and experience. This session will provide an overview of the processes in the brain involved in motor control and motor learning. The learner will gain a broad perspective of the complex process of controlling movement and the implications of injury to the brain on motor behavior.
