**Objectives:** Participants will be able to:

- Describe substance use as a developmental disorder.
- Identify risk and protective factors related to substance use in youth, including those with disabilities.
- 3. Discuss strategies for prevention, assessment and early intervention.

Substance use in adolescents remains a significant public health concern. Individuals with disabilities (and their families) face more severe social consequences from substance use-related problems than those without disabilities. There has been a recent dramatic rise in drug overdose deaths in adolescents. A recent report by the National Institute on Drug Abuse shows that in 2022, about 1 in 10 eighth graders, 1 in 5 tenth graders, and 1 in 3 twelfth graders reported illicit drug use in the past year. There is a need to understand adolescent substance use from the developmental perspective. This presentation aims to increase knowledge and awareness among professionals regarding the need to understand and treat adolescent addiction through the lens of emotions, cooccurring disorders, and best practices for intervention.
