- 3. Demonstrate understanding and knowledge of best practices that produce more equitable experiences and outcomes for Black youth.
- 4. Apply the "Family as Host" model for culturally responsive practice and learn practical strategies for targeting engagement early and throughout the care and service provision process to promote positive health outcomes for Black youth.

To achieve health equity, eliminate disparities and improve the health of all groups, there is the a need for coalition building and strategies for promoting positive mental health outcomes for youth of color and other racial and ethnic groups. For the marginalized and underserved youth, families, and communities, the pathways to effective mental health services and supports are complex and challenging to navigate. This workshop will provide a unique learning opportunity for participants on prevention and effective strategies, which promote positive mental health outcomes for the marginalized and underserved youth, families, and communities.
