1.	Check orders.	Orders are current and up to date.						
2.	Wash hands.							
3.	 a. Lubricant b. Catheter c. Wet wipes d. Urine	Encourage participation by allowing the student to be involved as much as possible.						
4.	Explain procedure at student's level of understanding.	Will help student to achieve self-care skills. Encourage participation, with supervision.						
5.	Position student.	May be done lying down, sitting in wheelchair, or on toilet.						
6.	Put on gloves.							
7.	Lubricate tip of catheter and place on clean surface.							
8.	Clean the penis. Start at urethral opening and wash in circular motion away from the meatus.	Helps to move bacteria away from the opening of the penis.						
9.	Hold the penis at 45-90 degree angle, depending on student's position.							
10	Insert catheter gently. Some resistance may be met at bladder sphincter. Use gently, but firm pressure.	Do not force. Report any unusual resistance.						

11. Encourage child to relax.	Deep breathing will help relax the bladder. Ask the student to bear down to help empty bladder. If sitting, have student lean forward to also help.			
12. When flow stops, insert catheter slightly further to be sure all urine has drained.	Rotate catheter so that all catheter openings have reached the bladder.			
13. Pinch catheter as you withdrawal.	Prevent backflow of urine into the bladder.			
14. Record urine output.	Assess for changes in color, odor and amount. Note unusual wetting between cath times.			
15. Remove gloves and wash hands.
