


These lengths of stays are similar to the length of stays at other pediatric rehabilitation hospitals nationwide.

What kinds of improvements might patients receiving treatment from the **Brain Injury Program be expected to make?** Kennedy Krieger Institute uses The Functional Independence Measure for Children (WeeFIM) for standardized pediatric outcomes measurement. This system is used by pediatric inpatient, outpatient, and community-based rehabilitation programs worldwide and provides a simple, consistent, uniform tool that measures function Patients made improvements in their self-care skills and mobility skills that were similar or exceeded improvements made at other pediatric rehabilitation hospitals of patients met or exceeded their WeeFIM goals




