# Dr. James A. Ferguson EID RISE Fellowship

- □ Dr. Ferguson was the fourth dean of Tuskegee University's School of Veterinary Medicine and first Tuskegee alumnus to serve in that capacity in 1991.
- During his tenure on the NCID Board of Scientific Counselors, Dr. Ferguson advocated for a fellowship to introduce medical and veterinarian students to the field of public health.
- □ An eight-week Summer Research Fellowship Program was instituted in 1989 at the CDC/NCID.
- □ Morehouse School of Medicine and Tuskegee University School of Veterinary Medicine were the first schools to participate.
- □ The program was renamed in Dr. Ferguson's honor in 1999.

## Ferguson RISE Fellowship Goals

- Promote knowledge of and commitment to careers in public health.
- Focus on graduate students who are in medical, dental, veterinary medicine, pharmacy, social science, and public health professions.
- Provide research and clinical experiences to develop critical thinking, leadership skills, scientific presentations and publications.

opportunities at the CDC.





### **Advanced Molecular Detection and Wastewater Surveillance**

- Newly CDC funded focus research areas with the Ferguson Fellowships
- Advanced molecular detection (AMD) integrates traditional epidemiology with next-generation sequencing and bioinformatics to provide detailed information on disease-causing organisms.
- AMD allows public health agencies across the United States to identify and solve outbreaks that, in the past, would not have been detectable.
- AMD is now central to the U.S. public health system's efforts to identify, track, and stop infectious disease.
- Wastewater surveillance is a method to monitor for pathogens within a community. It involves the systematic sampling, processing, and analysis of wastewater to detect the genetic material of targeted pathogens.

- 2. If you are unavailable, is there a substitute mentor or preceptor who will be able to work with the Fellow?
- 3. Will all necessary data, equipment, reagents, IRB approval, etc., be available by June 1 for summer fellows?
- 4. Most importantly, do you have sufficient time to spend with the Ferguson Fellow, i.e., at least 30-60 minutes per week to meet individually with the Ferguson Fellow regarding the Fellows' research and professional development?

**Please Note:** Ferguson RISE Fellows are expected to produce a poster or oral presentation of their research at the close of their respective programs.
